


London Wolves Player of the Season 2015-2016 Matt "The Doc" Doherty

Congratulations to former London Wolves member Jacqui Oatley who was awarded an MBE in the 2016 New Year's Honours for services to broadcasting and diversity in sport. Jacqui is a Wolverhampton girl who moved to London after finishing university, she then played for Chiswick Ladies on a Sunday, but more importantly supported the Mighty Wolves as part of the London Wolves following on a Saturday. As they say, "You can take the girl out of Wolverhampton but you can't take Wolverhampton out of the girl".

Jacqui is best known for being the first female commentator on BBC1's "Match of the Day", which she went on to present in March 2015. As well as Match of the Day she has also fronted "Final Score" for the BBC and "The Football League Show". She was also the first female presenter of the BBC's flagship sports news radio show "Sportsweek" on BBC Radio 5 Live, an impressive CV indeed.

Jacqui turned up at our big 50th bash on the 16th July, and duly introduced all of our special guests. Applying all of the professional presentation skills acquired over the past few years she showed all the enthusiasm and excitement, as all of us present on the night were, at welcoming some of the legends of the past.

Mark Feehan and sons' line-up at Molineux

Lifelong Wolves fan Mark Feehan (53) from South London got to realise a lifetimes ambition to 'live the dream' when he played at Molineux in a Football Aid hosted charity game, alongside his two Wolves supporting sons, Jack and Joe, aged 20 and 18 respectively. His sons were introduced into following Wolves in 2000 when they were aged five and three respectively.

Mark's first match watching Wolves was in 1973 when he went with his brother-in-law to see a 3-1 away victory at Tottenham, and he has been hooked ever since. Now a season ticket holder and a member of London Wolves Supporters Club since 1976, he travels from his home in Surrey to every home, and most away games. He rates the League Cup Final in 1980 for the occasion and the win as his favourite memory from his time following Wolves over the years.



Mark said, "I've been an active participant of the Football Aid Charity for thirteen years, the first couple just playing at Molineux myself, then I got persuaded to play at a couple of other venues after a few years and caught the 'let's do the rounds' bug, having visited and watched football at every league, and most non-league grounds, mostly watching Wolves as they descended and climbed the leagues in the late eighties, I decided I'd try to do as many as I could playing on them. After this year I will have played at all bar two grounds that Football Aid arrange annual games at. I thought this year I would 'pass on the charity game reins' to my two children as they reached the age they could play, and originally arranged for all three of us to play at a special 'bow out' game, and when the opportunity for all three of us to participate at the place where my heart lies (Molineux), it was just the perfect setting for the event for me. This is a great cause and more importantly I've have made some lifelong friends all over the country".

Former players Matt Murray, Tony Daley, Rob Edwards, Lee Naylor and Adam Proudlock joined both teams' for the game at Molineux to add to the Football Aid experience. The concept of Football Aid is simple - to allow fans, who have only been able to dream about it, the chance to experience the thrill of match day, to pull on their favourite shirt, walk down the tunnel to the sound of the crowd and play an adrenaline fuelled ninety minutes on the hallowed turf of the Club they support.

Since Football Aid's debut season in 2001, 614 games involving 16,285 players have taken place on a UK Club, European and International level. Football Aid was created as a unique way of raising money for charity and voluntary organisation's. Through their parent charity, Field of Dreams' multi-beneficiary grant award scheme, the funds raised from the Football Aid events are distributed to diabetes research, education and management projects plus charities nominated for funding by the Clubs that take part. The charity is extremely proud to have donated over $\pounds 2.2m$ in charitable grants since 2001.

Wolves Tribute for the 50th Anniversary of WWLSC (23rd April 2016)



In honour of London Wolves celebrating their 50th Anniversary, Wolves paid tribute by organising a special reception in the Stan Cullis Stand Wolves Museum before the Rotherham game on St George's Day. Peter Abbott was the man who was mainly instrumental in helping make the event happen following an invite from the Wolves board, and below he explains what a wonderful experience it was for all those who attended:-



I was at first surprised, and then excited, when I took a call from Wolves proposing to host a special event at Molineux to celebrate London Wolves' 50th anniversary year before the end of last season. Matt Grayson, Head of Marketing and Communications, suggested for around 40-50 members, a buffet-style grub, meet and chat with club personnel, officials and players (where possible) in say, a cordoned-off area of the museum, for a designated time pre-match, and that he would put this to Board members saying "the club wanted to thank London Wolves for it's amazing and long-time support..."

In discussion with the London Wolves Committee, it was obvious they were delighted Wolves were making this marvellous gesture in recognising our dedication, and that it would be a great opportunity and honour for the supporters club. We were especially grateful for this marvellous recognition of our long standing support and very keen to participate, we agreed it would be held pre-match of the Rotherham game.

I thus liaised with Paul Richards, Head of Safeguarding & Supporter Liaison Officer, to make all the necessary arrangements at Wolves, appropriately enough given our 50 years, according to Chairman Stuart Earl, to be held in the club's Stan Cullis Stand Wolves Museum.

Jez Moxey, Chief Executive, welcomed us in the matchday programme and after a bite to eat, hosted proceedings, presenting London Wolves with a framed copy of the match day programme against Rotherham, matched with the Rotherham programme from 1966-67 season. This will be housed, symbolically, in the North Bank Bar near where it all started, and which has been home to many members down the years. Stuart then presented Jez with a special version of our player of the season trophy to also be hung nearby.

Jez was accompanied by the Baroness of Wolves, Rachel Heyhoe-Flint, Club Secretary Richard Skirrow, Head of Marketing Matt Grayson, Head of Commercial Affairs Laurie Dalrymple, and Head of Ticketing, Lynne O'Reardon. We were also delighted to see our friends from Wolves Women FC, Anna Perks, high scoring first team coach, Claire Hakeman and manager Steve Cullis.

Naturally, being a match-day the day's team could not be with us. However, as an added bonus star striker Nouha Dicko, who we hope soon to see back on the pitch, and centre back Ethan Ebanks-Landell, also injured at the time joined in the celebrations. Also present to join us were since departed Adam Le Fondre (ALF) who had been due to start but had picked up an injury, and reserve goalkeeper Aaron McCarey.

The Bluebrick in Wolverhampton



If you're ever unsure of where to go for a few beers when you get off the train at Wolverhampton then carry on reading. Our very own Paul "Pintsize" Coles will be evaluating all the local hostelries and giving you the ins and outs of the pubs favoured by the London Wolves members, and help you decide where you can have your pre-match drink. The first up is The Bluebrick which has hosted a number of our Social Events over the past few years.

The Bluebrick is quite a large pub and its location is next to the Wolverhampton Railway Station and the Premier Inn, it mostly caters for diners but drinkers are more than welcome. There is ample seating and I would say a medium bar area. There are a couple of large TV screens showing the news and a few quiz machines if you like that sort of thing.

Now for the beer: There are three hand pumps, Pedigree, Hobgoblin and the third is for guest ales, if you're lucky you may get a Banks's which is always a nice drop. As for lagers there's the usual suspects; Stella (Yorkshireman John's favourite) and Carling etc.. etc.. There is Guinness extra cold and one cider on tap, but you can buy bottles of cider, there is all the usual spirits and shots a couple of wines to choose from, and those that know me I always celebrate a victory with a glass of Red "Large of course".

The food is mostly standard pub food, having said that I had a lovely steak there on the last game of the season. There are a couple of tasty meal deals on the food menu so you could have a nice cheap meal if you need to save some coppers as Dave or Roy will try to sell you something. There is a large outdoor sitting area so if it's a fine day you may like to pop outside for a beer'n'tan. The bar staff are very friendly, but on match days things can get a little hectic. London Wolves members use The Bluebrick for their meeting place on match days (Saturdays only). Roy and Peter have loyalty cards so if you go to the bar be sure to ask them for the card as points make prizes. I hope you like my review and you raise a glass or two!!

50 Years of London Wolves In the Beginning

Wolverhampton Wanderers London Supporters Club was founded in 1966. Over the next few pages we will learn how the club was formed with some articles written by those who were there from the very early days when it all began. Dave Slape gets the ball rolling with a detailed account of how it all started, a few of his favourite memories, and as its Dave a few facts and figures.

Our hard working Travel secretary Peter Woodifield is next. Stuart may have organised the inaugural coach trip to the Plymouth game, but Peter is the "Travel King" these days. He thanklessly puts in the time and effort to get the best travel deals and supply tickets for every Wolves game both home and away. He mentions some of his favourite games over the years and he should know he's seen them all.

Next up is the Big Fella Stuart Earl, who has been there and seen it all. In his short article he reminisces about one of his favourite away trips to Huddersfield, and it really shows how football has changed over the years to how it is now.

Finally long time London Wolves member and Wolverhampton born Harley Bill Singleton tells how he first came across London Wolves, moved to London and became one of those who travelled week in week out following the Mighty Wolves.

In between there are the photos from the superb 50th Anniversary Dinner held at Charlton Football Ground on 16th July 2016.

So Here We Go.....

Once upon a time there was a tavern Where we used to raise a glass or two, or three or four!



The Club originally started with about 12 people meeting Wolves' Secretary Jack Howley before the Portsmouth home game in the 1966-67 season. Before that infamous day I would travel with Barrie Avis and then at a later date with Malcolm Woods, but mostly solo. I would run into our now Chairman Stuart Earl who used to travel with Jeff Bail, and Terry O'Connor would always be around along with Jack Samuels, Tony Paradise and Ray Finch.

We would all travel from Paddington to Wolverhampton Low level Station. Anyway, after meeting Jack Howley, Stuart was voted "Leader" and organised the travel to the Plymouth game using Cresta Coaches. We would travel by coach every Saturday from Fulham Broadway, and at a later date from Elizabeth Bridge at Victoria. Fares would be 50p or 75p to Molineux, but after a couple of years support waned and we changed from Golden Miller coaches back to the trains. We ran a train trip to a cup match at Burnley and have used the trains more or less ever since.



Initially, the travelling London Wolves members would be admitted to Molineux free of charge thanks to Jack Howley. We would pass the reception and walk along the main corridor, out the doors onto the pitch and then along the perimeter to the North Bank. But after two or three years we felt we were causing a problem, so we thanked the club and paid at the turnstiles thereafter.

There were two coach trips that come to mind, both to Manchester City in the 1967-68 season and then also the season after. During the first trip the coach broke down and a replacement was sent, we finally arrived at Maine Road at 4:00pm. The gates were locked until 4:20pm, and when we did finally get inside the ground, it was just in time to see the Doog have a headed goal disallowed. The day didn't get any better, we lost 2-0 and got soaked by probably the heaviest rain I have ever seen.

The next season we ran a coach to the midweek fixture, and the few who went had to pay £2.50 each, which at the time was a third of a weekly wage. The equivalent these days is a plane ride to Europe, but we didn't care, we were proper Jack the Lads and there was no expense spared watching our beloved Wanderers.

In 1967-68 we shared coaches with the London Man United Supporters Club for the two games over Christmas, to start with it was equal numbers of supporters occupying each coach. Gerry Hirth's mate, Dave Bell, had joined London Wolves but was an ex-Red so there was some heavy banter between the sets of fans on one of the coaches. It got so heated at one stage that during a service station stop both sets of fans separated onto their own separate coaches. Wolves lost both games.

In 1979, 38 of us went to Grimsby in the League Cup and it was Trevor Peachey and John Harvey's birthdays. The guard of the local train stopped the train at New Clee so we could exit the nearest station to Blundell Park. After the match the driver came to the rail bar at Cleethorpes to remind us of the departure time, imagine that now. At Doncaster we had one and a half hours to kill while waiting for the London Train, so we all paid 40p admission into a local disco. The trip finally arrived back at Kings Cross at 6:30am in the morning.

Club membership topped 400 twice around 1980, but dwindled dramatically to about 120 in the dark ages of the Bhatti Brothers when we sank into Division 4 and teetered on the brink of extinction. The club has held various events over the years, from East to South London pubs, a BT club, and the Caernavon Hotel in Ealing to Charlton Athletic's Valley Ground. It's at the Valley where we held our 40th, 45th and most recently our 50th Anniversary celebration dinners. At the 40th most of the team from the 1966 Plymouth Argyle match attended the celebration dinner.

Those were the days my friend We thought they'd never end




The first person I met from London Wolves (before the club was officially formed), was of course Dave Slape. He was standing by the away turnstiles at Crystal Palace in April 1966, asking every Wolves fan who entered the ground if they lived in London or the South. I didn't meet Stuart until the first official London Wolves trip in October 1966 to the Plymouth home match.

I've seen many great matches, and quite a number of poor ones, too numerous to mention. However, a couple of games versus the Albion away stand-out. We drew 3-3 in one game and won the other 4-2, possibly one of Waggy's best ever games in a Wolves shirt. Of course, seeing Wolves at Wembley for the first time in 1974 against Man City was another great occasion, and no Wolves fan will ever forget the Play-Off Final in 2003 when we beat Sheffield United 3-0. There was also the game versus Leicester in the Premier League when we were 3-0 down at half time, but a great second half display resulted in a 4-3 win. Another memorable game was Peter Knowles last league game in a Wolves shirt before quitting football, a very sad occasion for all Wolves fans.

Fortunately, most of the trips we've run have been trouble free, but I can remember some which have been memorable for the wrong reasons. One that stands out is when we hired a minibus to take us to Leeds in the early 1970's. The company must have supplied the worst vehicle and driver. We arrived in Leeds at about 7:20pm after a very eventful journey. The vehicle had no reverse and inevitably, after watching us lose 4-1, we broke down at Harrow and the company had to send out a relief minibus.

Also a few of us travelled on a Spurs special train to the League Cup semi-final at Molineux in 1973 which broke down at Bletchley, and we didn't get to the ground until about half-time. Never Again!! In 1993, the train from Newcastle to London was delayed by about four hours, after two signal failures and the train catching fire. The train company laid on taxis at Kings Cross to take passengers to their destinations. I think I arrived home at about 4:30am on the Sunday morning, just in time to watch a repeat of Match of the day, but we'd won 2-0 at Sunderland, so most of us weren't too concerned about the delay.


Post-match, the driver informed us that we had to await the arrival of a replacement from London. We all decided to see the team aboard their bus, and as usual, Sid Kipping called me to help him load the kit basket into the boot.

Whilst standing outside the player's entrance, I got into conversation with a gentleman who commented that I had neither a Wolves nor local accent, and I relayed our story to him.

He then asked why we did not travel back by train, and I explained that we could not afford to. On hearing this, the gentleman said, "If I lend you the money for the train fare, will you return it?" I replied that we would, and without another word he disappeared into the main entrance, and returned with a fistful of cash and his name written on a piece of paper.

There were more than twenty of us, so the fares were quite substantial. It transpired that this was none other than Mr Kayne, Chairman of Huddersfield Town FC. What are the chances of this happening today? (Must get round to sending him a cheque!)

I can remember the very early days of London Wolves. I would be standing on the North Bank and all the supporters in the stand would chant a loud welcome as London Wolves appeared out of the old Waterloo Road Stand player's entrance onto the pitch. They would walk down the touchline and join us in the infamous North Bank. At the time I didn't know they had an agreement with the then Wolves' Secretary Jack Howley to get in for free, or I would have mingled in with them.

I regularly started to meet up and socialise with those London Wolves fans who I saw walking down the hallowed turf into the North Bank every other week. These boys went to all the games, and I would catch up with them at many of the away games, especially those in London. I became good friends with Dave Slape, Pete Woodifield and the other London Wolves members who they travelled with.

In 1969 I moved to the Metropolis, became a member and used to travel with them on the coach to the games. Wherever they travelled they always liked a few beers and there were many memorable trips. In those days there was no ban on coaches stopping at service stations, and on the way back from many games the coach would park up at Watford Gap Services for a pit stop.

There was no nipping to the cafe for a cup of tea and ham sandwich, it was a mission to find a pub somewhere nearby so we could grab a beer. I can still remember Stuart Earl's famous last words "I know where there's a pub". We clambered over fences and fields, and then eventually, after what seemed like miles at the time, found a pub. It was a quick couple of pints and then a dash back to the coach, we've been dashing around ever since with Dave and Pete to find the best pubs on our travels.

I left the Wolves for a while to support my other team, I won't go into who they were, but came back when I saw the light! In the mid-90s, and as it's my home town club I felt the lure and pride of the Black Country, but more than anything I missed Dave, Pete, and even Stuart, and the rest of the London Wolves following. It was very humbling as they welcomed me back into their fold.

If you ever need a question answering about Wolves or their history then talk to Dave Slape, he typifies what London Wolves is all about. He has an abundance of football rhetoric and remembers everything, especially who scored for Wolves in any match, any year from 1966.

Finally I would like to say that the London Wolves are some of the best and loyal football fans in the country, supporting our beloved Wolves through the good and bad times, and I will always treasure the fond memories of their company and friendship over the years.

Come on you Wolves !!!!!



WOLVES 1-1 NOTTINGHAM FOREST Friday 11th December 2015


Wolves threw yet another two points down the drain against Nottingham Forest in this Friday night televised TV game for Sky. It's now five home games without a win and a play-off place looks a million miles away. The story of Wolves season so far is one of inconsistency and failing to finish off teams after dominating games, and this was no exception. After taking an early lead they missed a host of chances to put the game to bed, and in the end Forest conjured up a late equaliser to snatch a point.



It was forest who started the brighter and Lichaj should really have scored with an early header from a corner but he was wide of the target, and as it looked like it was going to be one of those nights Wolves scored with their first real attempt on goal. After being brought down out on the left flank Jordan Graham dusted himself down and whipped in a beauty of a freekick into a crowded Forest goalmouth, and Ebanks-Landell came charging in at the far post to bury a powerful header into the net.

Forest responded immediately, and they were again guilty of some poor finishing when Mills found himself in acres of space on the edge of the six-yard area, but like Lichaj before him he could only direct his free header straight into the arms of the grateful lkeme. It should have been 2-0 to Wolves in the 36th minute, but old Wolves boy and WWLSC sponsored player Doris De Vies pulled off a superb one handed save to deny Le Fondre after the striker had charged down an attempted clearance by Mancienne.

Wolves continued to push forward and they missed another golden opportunity just before half-time when Le Fondre released Graham inside the area, but the youngster fired his shot into the side-netting with only the goalkeeper to beat.



Wolves were made to pay for their wasteful finishing with just ten minutes left, substitute Blackstock who had only been on the pitch for only three minutes stole in at the far post to volley home the equaliser from a Lansbury corner. There was to be one last gasp chance for Wolves, Graham's left-wing corner dropped nicely to McDonald who lashed a 20-yard screamer on the volley, but fortunately for Forest Pinillos blocked the goal bound shot with De Vries beaten.

For the second week in a row the Sky cameras were at Molineux to broadcast a Championship League game. This was part of a 14 day sequence where there was a Football League game on Sky every night, unfortunately for Wolves this game was on a Thursday? It's now six consecutive games at home without a win for Wolves and the way they capitulated after being a goal up will set the alarm bells ringing for Kenny Jackett.

After a bit of cat and mouse at the start of the game Leeds almost took the lead in spectacular fashion in the 7th minute, the ball fell to Dallas 25 yards out and his volley rattled the post with Ikeme rooted to the spot. A minute later Afobe missed a glorious chance to rub salt in the Leeds wounds




when he dragged his shot across the face of goal after Graham had set him up. Fortunately, the striker didn't have to wait long to make amends for his howler, in the 10th minute he pounced onto a knockdown from Henry and coolly slotted the ball past Silvestri to put Wanderers one up.

As with the last game against Forest Wolves took control after the early goal and went for the kill. Afobe failed to hit the target from two good openings and Graham forced Silvestri into a smart save as Wolves piled on the pressure. However it was a case of déjà vu as Wolves paid the ultimate price for not converting any of those chances into goals, right on the stroke of half-time Byram played a onetwo with Wood on the edge of the area and then stabbed the ball past Ikeme for the equaliser.

The defending for the goal was poor to say the least, and that basically set the trend for what can only be described as a second-half horror show, you could watch better defending at any under 8's game on a Sunday morning. Leeds were made to look like Barcelona and they poured further misery on Wolves just six minutes into the second-half. Dallas played a onetwo with Doukara and then drilled the ball past lkeme from just inside the area, although the keeper will be disappointed at being beat at his near post.

Wolves were totally shell shocked and as Leeds ran riot Ikeme kept them in the game when he pulled off a stunning save to deny Wood. The big keeper came to the rescue again just a few minutes later when he pulled off another breath-taking save from Wood after his central defenders Ebanks-Landell and Batth collided going for the ball in a scene that could have come from any old Keystone Cops film. Wolves luck finally ran out on the hour mark, Taylor's cross from the left to the far post found one of Leeds shortest players Byram who easily beat the clueless Golbourne in the air to head home.

If Wolves thought that they could bounce straight back after the Leeds fiasco then they were sadly mistaken. They continued where they left off in the last game, only this time is was a real drubbing. Wolves were previously unbeaten in their last ten games with the Owls but that statistic was well and truly shot to pieces as another poor performance made it two defeats on the spin and seven goals against.

As with the previous two games Wolves got off to a cracking start, they started with intent and deservedly took the lead on the quarter of an hour mark. Doherty made a break down the left and when he continued his run into the penalty area Wallace chopped him down for a stone wall penalty, Afobe stepped up and calmly sent the keeper the wrong way from the spot-kick to make it 1-0.

Unfortunately the joy was short lived, after getting themselves in front Wolves' recent defensive frailties reared their ugly head just four minutes later as the lead was surrendered cheaply. A long ball was sent into the Wolves half and Joao was chased by both Batth and Ebanks-Landell, naively both defenders challenged the forward at the same time and then had to watch the



theatricals as the player performed a dive Tom Daley would have been proud of. The end result a harsh penalty that was converted by Forestieri to level the scores.

No sooner had lkeme picked the ball out of the net heads we're already dropping, and the early positive attitude disappeared as Wednesday started to push forward. Just ten minutes after taking the lead Wolves were suddenly behind, a poor defensive header from Batth fell to Forestieri who lashed in a fierce shot from 12 yards that deflected off a defender and into the net.

Within a blink of an eyelid the game had been turned on its head with Wednesday now in the ascendance, however Wolves missed a glorious chance to equalise against the run of play. Graham sent over a glorious cross from the left and Byrne somehow managed to head it over from three yards. Wednesday also had chances to increase their lead before the interval, a goalmouth scramble saw Ikeme save from both Joao and Forestieri before the ball fell to Wallace who blazed the ball wide with the keeper still on the deck.

The game became like a Freddy Krueger movie for Wolves in the second-half, a real horror show. They were second best to every ball, and the inevitable came on the hour mark when Wednesday added a third. A cross from the left was cleared by Doherty but only as far as Pudil, he was given the time and space as the Wolves defence stood off him, and he picked his spot before firing past Ikeme from the edge of the area.

As Wednesday stormed forward the Wolves defence were all over the shop and Kenny Jackett's boys never looked like getting back into the game, if anything it had become a damage limitation exercise. Forestieri missed two good chances to complete his hat-trick from good positions and Bannan also blazed just over from distance. The closest Wolves came to pulling a goal back came in the 71st minute when Ethan Ebanks-Landell saw his header cleared off the line by Hunt.

With time running out Wolves showed no signs of a comeback and Hooper put the final nail in the coffin in the last minute, Nuhiu slipped the ball through inside the area and the on-loan striker made no mistake from eight yards. The result means Wolves have won just once in their last eight games.

Afobe then had a massive shout for a penalty turned down when it looked like Quinn had clipped his ankle inside the area, but this time is was Reading who breathed a huge sigh of relief as the referee waved play on. It was now Wolves turn to attack and that man Afobe was within a whisker of doubling the lead on the half hour mark, but his flick on from Henry's cross came agonisingly back off the post.

As the first-half reached its conclusion Reading again regained the upper-hand and more frantic Wanderer's defending saw lorfa and Batth diving in with crucial blocks to deny Robson-Kanu and somehow keep the score at 1-0 to the home side at the break.

The Reading offensive continued in the second-half and they came within a whisker of levelling straight after the restart when Norwood let fly from 30 yards, but his shot crashed back off the post with Ikeme well beaten. The Wolves goal continued to live a charmed life and Ikeme saved from Vydra before Robson-Kanu headed a corner over the bar when he looked certain to score.

Wolves seemed unable to keep hold of the ball with Reading dominating possession, but for all the huff and puff they were unable to find the back of the Wolves net, although they went close on more than one occasion. Afobe had a chance to ease the Wolves nerves two minutes from time but he shot wildly over the bar from the edge of the area.

It was back to back victories for Wolves for the first time since the beginning of October, it wasn't the prettiest football game you're ever going to watch, but at the end of the day a win's a win. That's now six points out of six for the holiday period and it just about keeps alive Wolves' slender hopes of a top six finish.

Both teams have been scratching for results lately and this showed as the two struggled to get going, it was a scrappy game and as a result chances were at a premium. Wolves just edged the first-half and created the only real chance of note in the 28th minute, Batth flicked on a free-kick into the path of Afobe, but the striker struggled to get a good contact on the ball and Henderson in the Charlton goal rushed to claim it.

With the entertainment factor at a minimum some of the fans must have been wondering whether they should have stayed at home and faced the prospect of more turkey sandwiches and watching the rerun of The Great Escape. However, in time added on in the first-half there was brief respite from the football when Charlton substitute Lookman collided with referee Keith Hill and much to the amusement of the fans the official went down like a roll of lino.

Referee Hill failed to make the field after half-time causing a 15 minute delay to proceedings, that wiped the smiles off the faces of the laughing supporters when they realised they would be detained even longer in what had already been an endurance test at Stalag Valley.

Wolves showed more purpose when the game finally got underway again, and Graham went close in the 48th minute when he curled a shot just wide of the post following a rapid break on the left. However, just five minutes later the youngster managed to break the deadlock, Afobe made a powerful run down the right and when he pulled the ball across the box the winger was on hand to ram it home from eight yards.

The goal was just what Wolves needed and suddenly there was a higher tempo to their play, and they nearly doubled the lead just two minutes later when Afobe struck a low drive from outside the area, but Henderson just managed to get a hand on the ball and turn it round the post.

Charlton tried to push forward but there was an obvious lack of confidence in their overall passing and build-up play. Wolves comfortably coped with everything Charlton could throw at them and sealed all three points with a second goal in the 83rd minute, Graham sent over a corner into the six yard box and Lennon poked it past his own keeper with Batth breathing down his neck. With only a few minutes left Wolves easily played out time to finish 2015 with a win.



BRIGHTON 0-1 WOLVES Friday 1st January 2016

As at Charlton in the previous game it wasn't the best game of football you're ever going to see but the New Year started on a high for Wolves with a 1-0 win against Brighton, their first win over the Seagulls for 20 years. A first half own goal by Wolverhampton born and Wolves supporter Connor Goldson ensured maximum points for the holiday period as the dream of promotion back to the big time is suddenly back on the agenda.



Brighton continued to dominate possession, this was helped by some sloppy Wolves passing which resulted in them continually giving the ball away and putting themselves under pressure. However, lady luck cast her eye on Wolves in the 32nd minute when they went in front. They broke through midfield and the ball was sprayed out to Graham on the left wing, he attacked the full-back and sent over a wicked low cross that Goldson stuck out a leg at and inadvertently sliced it past Stockdale into the net.

What a tonic for Wolves, the Amex Stadium went silent except for the end holding the away supporters. Wolves threatened again as Brighton wobbled and Stockdale prevented another goal when he parried away a low drive from Henry. Wolves went into the break a goal to the good having seemed to have eliminated the all too often schoolboy errors made at crucial times over the season so far.

Wolves breathed a sigh of relief but there was still one more scare to come. With five minutes of added time already played a cross from the right was met by the head of Dunk just six yards out, but Ikeme



pulled off a wonder save to tip it over the bar. That was it, job done and another three points in the bag. After the defeats against Leeds and Sheffield Wednesday Wolves have shown great character to come back fighting and get the season back on track.

Le Fondre had an effort in the last seconds of time added on when lorfa fed him six yards out, but he scuffed his shot and it trickled wide, and with it ended Wolves hopes of a cup run.

Four days ago we witnessed probably Wolves worst performance of the season away at Brentford, so bad was that effort that the team were abused and booed off at the end of each half by their own supporters.

However, just two minutes before the break Derby drew level. Saville turned villain when he conceded a needless foul on the edge of the area, Martin stepped up, lifted the freekick over the Wolves wall and beat Ikeme to his right-hand for the equaliser.



Derby, one of the favourites for promotion took control in the second-half, and Ince missed a glorious chance to put them in front in the 55th minute, he found himself ten yards out with only Ikeme to beat but shot wide.

LEEDS 2-1 WOLVES Tuesday 19th April 2016

Wolves found themselves on the wrong side of a 95th minute goal at Hull City in the Sky game just four days ago, losing 2-1 in



the process. On that occasion they were unlucky to have lost, here at Elland Road they again went down 2-1, but this time they were well beaten with their opponents Leeds hitting the woodwork twice and going close on several other occasions.

Things looked promising early on as Wolves knocked the ball about nicely and pushed forward into the Leeds half, and in the 5th minute Saville went close when his shot from outside the area was just wide of the post. A minute later and it was Leeds turn to attack, and they went within a whisker of taking the lead when Wood's 20 yard shot smashed against Wolves' righthand upright.

Back came Wolves again on the quarter of an hour mark and they missed a glorious chance to go in front. Sigurdarson beat the offside trap down the left and crossed to Henry who found himself unmarked five vards out, but the usually reliable winger volleyed the ball into the ground and wide. It was close again just moments later when Henry's shot was deflected behind the home defence into the path of Edwards, but Silvestri was first to the loose ball as the midfielder lost his footing. It was a false dawn for Wolves and Leeds took control with former Wolves target Chris Wood mounting a one man assault on Danny Batth and his defence. The striker watched his 30 yard free-kick go just wide of the Wolves post, and then he blew his easiest opportunity so far when he guided an effort straight in to the arms of Ikeme from point blank range.

Wolves threatened briefly at the start of the second-half when Doherty went on a winding run down the left and beat two defenders before lashing a shot wide from the edge of the box, but it was Leeds soon on the ascendancy again, and they eventually took the lead on the hour mark. Bamba took the ball down on his chest 25 yards out and let it bounce before lashing a half volley into the top corner of the net, giving Ikeme no chance.



Leeds went for the jugular and four minutes later it was 2-0, and it was poor defending all round by the Wolves defence. Cook wasn't closed down on the right-hand side and was allowed to pull the ball back across the area from the by-line, the ball fell to Diagouraga who was completely on his own 12 yards out and the striker picked his spot and swept it past lkeme.

Wolves suddenly pulled one back against the run of play in the 77th minute, Henry picked out Saville on the edge of the box and he curled a right footed shot into the corner of the net. The game suddenly opened up and Botaka rattled the Wanderers crossbar, while at the other end Mason had a shot kept out by the feet of Silverstri.

Wolves threw men forward in the search of an equaliser and in the last minute of normal time a corner taken by Henry flashed right across the face of goal, unfortunately evading all the Wolves shirts in its path. That was to be the last chance with Leeds playing keep ball and easing to the winning post

It was another bad day at the office for Kenny Jackett with his tactics and selection again under scrutiny. He continues to leave out Mason and persist with Sigurdarson who has now failed to find the net in a Wolves shirt in over 28 hours of football, that kind of tells you he's just not good enough.

WOLVES 0-0 ROTHERHAM Saturday 23rd April 2016

On a glorious Saint George's Day our beloved Wolves opened their doors and welcomed in London Wolves members in order to celebrate the 50th Anniversary of the formation of Wolverhampton Wanderers London Supporters Club. Prior



to the game a buffet was laid on in a cordoned-off area of the museum, and a presentation was made by Jez Moxey in order to celebrate our 50th Anniversary.

It was a fabulous gesture by the club, unfortunately the football that followed didn't match the hospitality shown before the game. For the fourth consecutive home game Wolves failed to find their opponents net. This time it was relegation threatened Rotherham who shut up shop and gain the point they required to enable them to play in the Championship again next year.

That's now eight games without a win for Wolves and eight scoreless draws during the season, seven of them at home. However, it wasn't through the lack of effort, they hit the bar, had one cleared off the line and missed a couple of sitters. But in the end the stats still show four nil-nils at home on the spin, and a lack of firepower up front to break down visiting teams' intent on defending.

Wolves looked determined at the start and created a good chance to get that all elusive goal in the 8th minute, a good passing move ended with Mason sending in a low cross from the left, but Edwards made a real hash of things and dragged the ball horribly wide. They came even closer midway through the half when Batth's header was brilliantly tipped onto the underside of the bar by Camp.

Following the initial Wolves pressure the game petered out into the same kind of dross as the previous goalless bore draws. Henry had a pot shot from distance which drew ironic cheers from the fans, with further efforts from Edwards and Doherty never looking like threatening Camp in the Rotherham goal, in fact the most noise the fans made was when they booed the players off at half-time.

Wolves tried to gather the initiative again after the break and created a string of chances, but they still couldn't find the back of the Rotherham net. Mason shot straight at Camp when put through, and then Deslandes missed an absolute sitter from two yards. There was an even better chance in the 58th minute when a great ball from Henry set Mason clear, but yet again he squandered the opportunity when his shot was smothered by the onrushing Camp.

Wolves must have known that it wasn't to be their day when they were denied twice in a matter of seconds as Camp denied Saville, and Kelly somehow managed to clear Wallace's rebound effort off the line after an almighty scramble in the box. More chances were created but not converted, and so the familiar sound of booing rang in the player's ears at full time.

NOTTINGHAM FOREST 1-1 WOLVES Saturday 30th April 2016



That's now nine games without a win, but at least Wolves scored a goal in the 1-1 draw at Nottingham Forest. After another poor first-half it was a much improved performance in the second-half and something for the fans to cheer about, and a glimmer of hope for next season.

It was Forest who just about started the brighter of the two teams, and in the 4th minute they created the first real chance when Gardener's long range shot clipped



the head of lorfa and dropped onto the roof of the Wolves net.

Wolves gradually gained a foot hole in the game, and Edwards went close with a curling effort after eight minutes. The game was a scrappy affair and Forest were next to engineer an opening when Blackstock headed just over following a cross by Osborn. And soon after another long range drive by Cohen was too close for comfort as it went just wide of Ikeme's right-hand post.

Play then swapped to the other end, and on the half hour mark Mason came close with a good effort from outside the box which just cleared the angle of post and bar. A few minutes later and it was yet another long range effort, this time from Henry, but his shot lacked power and it deflected safely into the arms of De Vries. The best chance of the half fell to Gardner in the dying seconds, Fox's header brought a superb save from Ikeme and then Gardner's rebound was cleared off the line by one of a melee of Wolves defenders. Yet again it was a poor performance from a Wolves team totally lacking confidence and unable to string two passes together, and it was a massive relief when the referee brought the first 45 minutes to its conclusion.

Wolves at last showed a bit of impetus at the start of the second-half, and Doherty sent a back-post header agonisingly wide from an in-swinging Saville free-kick in the 51st minute. Their best chance of the game came just five minutes later when Batth's shot from a corner on the left was cleared off the line, and then it was the Wolves Captain in the action again when he headed wide following an excellent cross by Wallace.

It was all Wolves and they finally got their noses in front just before the hour mark, Mason collected the ball outside the box and when it looked like there was little on he swivelled and bent a tremendous left-footed shot into the net via the post.

Five minutes later Wolves missed a glorious chance to double their lead, a three man move ended with the ball at Henry's feet in the centre of the area, he looked up and picked his spot but smashed it wide. It was a miss that would prove costly as Forest equalised in the 68th minute, Edwards conceded a free-kick on the edge of the area and Gardner stepped up and struck the ball over the wall and to Ikeme's right for the equaliser. Both sides had opportunities to win it late on, Conor Coady had the best of them for Wolves, but his dipping volley from distance sailed narrowly wide. That was basically it with both sides seeing out time for what was probably a fair result.

Well Wolves finally managed to score a home goal after four consecutive goalless score draws and over SIX hours of tedium for their long suffering supporters. Ironically the goal was scored by one of their opponents after just six minutes and Wolves ended up 2-1 winners. Sheffield Wednesday who were already in a guaranteed play-off place made ten changes from their previous game, but nothing should be taken away from a Wolves team who at least finished the season with a win.

Wednesday again went close a few minutes later when McGeady let fly from 20 yards, the ball took a wicked deflection off Hause and luckily for Wolves curled inches wide of Ikeme's left-hand post with the keeper rooted to the spot.

Back came Wolves and they came within a whisker of increasing the lead from a corner ten minutes before half-time, but Saville aguishly looked on as his shot from twelve yards thundered back off the inside of the post. However he shook off the disappointment and less than a minute later he fired home from close range following another good cross from Doherty.

After the high tempo up and at em' in the first-half it became a bit of an anti-climax after the break with Wolves going back into the all familiar "Already on the beach" attitude. Wednesday were the more positive of the sides and the most likely to score, although chances at either end were far and few between. Mason, who was Wolves best attacking option by a country mile was substituted for Edwards with 15 minutes left, if Wolves fans were hoping for a swashbuckling finish to the season then their hopes were ended there and then.

The Owls finally pulled a goal back a minute from the end when Doherty was harshly penalised for a handball in the area, and McGugan sent Ikeme the wrong way from the penalty spot to make it 2-1. Wednesday could even have snatched an injury time point as the panic alarms suddenly started sounding in the Wolves box, however Ikeme denied both Helan and

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Sasso with two fine saves as Wolves hung on for victory.

As a footnote it was announced a few days later that Bjorn Sigurdarson will not have his contract renewed next season and Le Fondre is going back to Cardiff. With nothing at stake during the last dozen games or so why did the manager pursue with these players instead of giving the youngsters a chance... baffling to say the least!!!! Well that's it for another season which failed to deliver anything in terms of achievement, quality of football, entertainment or prospects. Let's all hope for a minor miracle and the arrival of some quality players in the close season, miracles do sometimes happen like Leicester can testify to, however you need the players who have the quality, skill and hunger for a fight.
